IN MEMORIAM

Gavin C. Clark 4T4

Gavin was born and raised in Toronto, attended Upper Canada College, and entered engineering school at the University as a proud Alpha Delt in 1940. However, shortly thereafter, with the war in full swing, Gavin attended Naval Officer's School in Vancouver, and subsequently took command of Q085 (Fairmile), making him one of the youngest "Captains" in the Canadian navy at age 19. He spent the next four years patrolling and escorting supply convoys during the Battle of the Atlantic. Gavin held a true love of the navy and subsequently throughout the rest of his life.



Gavin joined Toronto-based Rolph Clark Stone Ltd., a printing and lithographing company, founded by his grandfather and rose to the position of Executive Vice President. During his time at RCS, Gavin attended Harvard's School of Business. Later he pursued a career in education, becoming Dean of Arts and later Dean of Business at Seneca College.

Gavin joined us for the 125th Anniversary Banquet in November 2018, and was honoured for his service as we made special tribute on the Centennial Anniversary of Armistice.

He will be remembered fondly by his Brothers in Alpha Delta Phi.

George C. Heintzman 6T2



George was born in Toronto in 1939, and attended Upper Canada and Neuchatel Colleges. He enrolled in the electrical engineering program at the University and joined Alpha Delta Phi in 1958, as a legacy of his father George T. Heintzman 3T2. After graduating, he spent most of career at IBM. Upon retirement he dedicated himself to helping companies in Armenia and Russia through his work with the Canadian Executive Service Organization.

He was dedicated to serving the community as an active member and former chapter president of the Rotary Club of Toronto Eglinton.

He will be missed by his wife, Mary, brothers, Ralph 6T5 and Tom, three children and four grandchildren along with his many friends in Alpha Delta Phi.

William P. Wilder CM Mem '44

Among his many achievements, Bill was a former chief executive of Wood Gundy, one of Canada's most prestigious securities firms and now part of CIBC, and of Consumers Gas, at the time the country's biggest natural-gas distributor. He served on the boards of numerous other blue-chip companies and, as a philanthropist, was among the biggest individual donors to Upper Canada College in Toronto.

Bill was born in Toronto in 1922 to William Edward and Marjorie Mary Wilder. He attended UCC and had planned to become an architect. But the depressed housing and construction industry in the late 1930s encouraged him to enroll instead for a commerce degree at McGill.



However, his studies were interrupted by the Second World War. After officer training at Royal Roads Naval College on Vancouver Island, he was seconded to the Royal Navy and saw active duty as a sub-lieutenant on the destroyer HMS Whitshed. One of Whitshed's final war-time duties was to escort U.S. troopships to the landing ground at Utah beach in northern France on D-Day, June 6, 1944.

Bill returned to McGill after the war to complete his studies, and then joined Wood Gundy, where his father had been a vice-president. He started as a bond salesman, but decided in 1948 to pursue an MBA at Harvard. He often described his two years at Harvard Business School as a life-changing experience that was invaluable in equipping him for his future career, leading him to give back to the school by funding refurbishments of the residences at HBS, now known as Wilder House.

Outside the corporate world, Bill was a life member of the Toronto Club, and served a two-year term as chairman and president of the York Club. The Toronto Club bestowed its annual honouree award on him in 2014. He also served on the board of The Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto for 16 years, and chaired the corporate division of the United Way. Although he was a member of the Memorial Chapter, Bill had an active presence in the Toronto Alpha Delt community. He was the Guest Speaker at the 1983 Alumni Banquet, and was a donor for many years.

In 2017 he was awarded the Order of Canada and was also inducted into the Investment Hall of Fame, and in 2018 he received The Legion of Honour from France in recognition of his war service.

Few Canadians, let alone Fraternity Brothers, live such impactful lives as Bill did, and so it is without doubt his absence will be felt by many.

News & Updates

Chris Kemp 0T6 was recently issued his sixth patent by the US Patent & Trademark office for Patent #9,984,425, "Following Data Records in an Information Feed." The patent was filed to protect the IP around mechanisms for automatically following records in a news feed based on defined rules.

Peter F. Love 7T1 has written an online textbook, *Fundamentals of Energy Efficiency: Policy, Programs and Best Practices*, for use by professors, students, and employees who require a better understanding of energy efficiency.

Jeyan Thangaraj 1T7 co-authored an article on the work he and his team have been doing at UC San Diego. The paper outlines their design for a drug- and light-responsive DNA modification system that can be used to activate cancer-killing CAR-T cells in precise locations throughout the body in order to destroy deadly tumors. It was published in *ACS Synthetic Biology*, a top American scientific journal.

Scott Jolliffe 7T3 has been elected Chair of the Canada Arab Business Council. He joined the CABC as Vice Chair and Secretary in June 2017, and has served as the organization's President since January 2018.

Tye Farrow 8T6 will serve as President of the University of Toronto Alumni Association for the 2019-2020 Academic Year.

Jeffrey Turnbull 7T4 was the inaugural recipient of the Association of Faculties of Medicine of Canada's Humanism Award for his work with those suffering from homelessness and addiction in Ottawa.

David Savage 1T5 was elected Class President at Beijing Culture and Language University, where he is completing an intensive program in Mandarin.

MYSTIC TIES CAMPAIGN LANDMARK DONATION

MYSTIC TIES CAMPAIGN UPDATE

The House Company launched the “Mystic Ties Campaign” officially on January 1st, 2018 in commemoration of our 125th Anniversary with the purpose of developing and executing a fundraising and relationship building effort that will result in all members of the Alpha Delta Phi Toronto Chapter having access to:

- (1) a physical plant that meets the standards befitting an organization of our reputation
- (2) programming and events that will bring together undergraduates and alumni in ways that advance our Brotherhood, and further our commitment to the Covenant of Alpha Delta Phi

The Board spent almost two years crafting this campaign as a follow up to the fundraising effort executed at the beginning of the decade. The earlier campaign, which lasted from 2010-2013, was in response to a dire situation at the Active Chapter. There were only a handful of Active members, and our property at 94 Prince Arthur Ave was in near-uninhabitable shape. The campaign was successful in rebooting the Chapter and giving it a new lease on life. Nonetheless, it was a campaign borne out of necessity and desperation.

Since then, our Chapter has recorded 10 consecutive successful rushing seasons, with our Active membership never falling below 30; our Alumni base has been reengaged with over 150 previously “lost” graduates reconnecting with the Fraternity; we have been honoured with multiple awards by Alpha Delta Phi International both for the strength of our Active Chapter and the excellence of our Alumni Board; and our Chapter consistently ranks as the best Fraternity on campus.

Suffice to say, the Mystic Ties Campaign has been launched from a position of strength, clarity, and focus. At the beginning of 2018, our stated mission was to raise \$700,000 over 10 years, to be used for renovating and upgrading the facilities at 94 Prince Arthur Ave.

I am glad to report that as we approach the end of Year 2 of this campaign, we are well on our way to our goal. As mentioned earlier in the newsletter, our campaign was given a kickstart by two monumental contributions in the first two years. Brs. Jamie Anderson 7T6 and Bill Downe 8T1 each donated \$25,000, giving us a foundation upon which we were able to start taking on major projects quickly and efficiently. Br. Anderson has also pledged a further \$50,000 in the form of a dollar-for-dollar matching campaign. So far, \$22,000 in eligible donations have been made towards this generous pledge.

These, along with the ongoing financial support of 107 other Graduate Brothers has resulted in \$300,000 worth of commitments through to 2023. Of that, \$157,000 has already been received and put to use. In 2018, we replaced the roof and all eavestroughs around the house, along with refinishing common area floors and renovating two bedrooms. This year, we did extensive work on the masonry of the house, replacing damaged bricks and sealing the envelope with new mortar. We also replaced thirty windows on the first and second floors, providing both functional and aesthetic upgrades to most rooms in the house.

Looking forward, we plan to finish work on the exterior of the House with the porch carpentry and railings in the Spring and then move onto interior upgrades that we all know the Chapter House needs. Items like wood panelling, renovating the basement, flooring and electrical work will be taken care of in due course.

While restoring 94 Prince Arthur to its original state as built in 1894 is an unrealistic aim, we hope – and are confident – that we can make the home of our Brotherhood a place we are all proud to share.

On behalf of the House Company, I give heartfelt thanks to all who have, and continue, to support the Fraternity. This has been an unprecedented run for our Chapter, and where in recent years many other Fraternities at the University have closed, we have thrived in large part due to our engaged Alumni base.

I also strongly encourage those who have not yet had a chance to give back to the Fraternity, to do so. As the saying goes, a chain is only as strong as its weakest link. We have all in some way or another benefitted from our membership in Alpha Delta Phi and so it behooves each of us to do our part in ensuring it remains an institution in Toronto for another century. Please consider supporting the campaign with a monthly, annual or one-time contribution.
